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



The aorta is the largest artery in the body, and it carries oxygenrich blood from the heart to the body. The thoracic aorta is the portion of this blood vessel that is in the thorax (chest). Left

Robots Are Transforming Our Operating Rooms

With rapid advancements in computer-guided equipment, more



patients are seeking out minimally invasive robotic-assisted surgical solutions for various medical conditions than ever before. Morristown Medical Center's state-of-the-art robotic surgery program offers patients the most sophisticated technology available, providing care across numerous specialties from general surgery to gynecologic, urologic, oncology, bariatric procedures – and more.

While surgery used to be associated with long hospital stays, blood loss, and pain, robotic surgery is changing this narrative for patients. Robot-assisted procedures offer advantages over traditional open surgery including, reduced recovery time, smaller incisions, significantly less postoperative pain and blood loss, and a quicker return to daily activities.

Morristown Medical Center pioneered its robotic surgery program back in 2005, starting with one robot, and since then, the program has grown to include 4 robots with more to come. Morristown Medical Center remains steadfast in its dedication to delivering the best possible outcomes to our patients using the most cutting-edge technologies.

The da Vinci[®] Surgical System allows surgeons to work inside a patient's body using small instruments that fit through tiny incisions. The instruments are precise, dexterous and have maximum range of motion that go beyond the capability of human hands. A three-dimensional camera magnifies visualization of the tissue and body structure and guides the surgeon during the entire procedure.

Our robust team of more than 25 surgeons use the da Vinci[®] Surgical System to perform minimally invasive robotic procedures at Morristown Medical Center and one outpatient surgical location at 111 Madison Avenue.

Your Gynecologist Is One of Your Most Valued Health Partners It's time to start taking care of you

he pandemic disproportionately impacted women's health. Along with a decrease in women getting regular health screenings, there was an increase in women – especially mothers – putting their own physical health and mental well-being on the back burner. "Women already had a lot on their plate and then all these other things happened, caused by the pandemic," says Diana Contreras, MD, medical director of OB/GYN and Women's Health, Atlantic Health System. She is dual board-certified in both gynecology oncology and obstetrics and gynecology. "Women had to leave some of their previous roles and take on different ones. The stress from that was tremendous."

GET BACK ON TRACK

Dr. Contreras says there has been a drop-off in women getting routine screenings. "From mammograms to visiting the dentist, it's time to start taking care of you," she says. Take stock of which appointments and screenings you've missed. "If you need to get a mammogram or a colonoscopy, don't schedule them the same week. It's OK to spread them out," says Dr. Contreras. "Make an inventory of your health; then start working on that list slowly. Small goals like beginning to walk for exercise can have a huge impact."

TURN TO YOUR GYN

Your gynecologist can discuss all of the issues that affect your overall health. Jill Skoczylas, MD, boardcertified in OB/GYN, focuses on treating the whole woman, including healthy lifestyle, mental health and providing education, as needed about their bodies and tools to be on top of their health. "The well-woman visit is a perfect time to ask questions about sexual health, abnormal periods, infertility, menopause and other obstetrics and gynecology issues. Wellwoman visits include a full checkup and focus on preventive care for women."

KNOW THE FACTS

Getting vaccinated is one proactive thing women can do to take charge of their health, and Dr. Contreras says that many of the fears surrounding COVID-19 vaccines



are unfounded. "I think it's really important that women get science-based information. There's no science behind the whole idea of infertility and the vaccine," she says. "We do know that millions of women have been fully vaccinated in the U.S., and that it's safe and effective."

DO A MENTAL HEALTH CHECK-IN

When it comes to our mental health, Elana Monchar, MD, Department of Psychiatry, Atlantic Health System, says there are a few things we can all do to feel better. "Setting a routine and sticking to it – that's really necessary in a world where we feel out of control," she says.

What you put in your body can affect your mental health, too. "Fuel your body with nutritious, well-balanced foods," says Dr. Monchar, who is board-certified in psychiatry. She also suggests prioritizing sleep. "It's hard to function at your optimum when you're sleep-deprived."



• FIND HEALTHY WAYS TO MANAGE STRESS

• Therapy can be the right choice for some women and has become even more accessible due to telehealth, says Dr. Monchar. Activities such as coloring, kickboxing, gardening or going out for a stroll can also help

keep stress in check. "It's going to take time to get back to a lot of things we did pre-pandemic," she says. "You don't have to do everything today. Give yourself time. Women have gone through a lot."

JUMPING FOR JOY, ATHLETES' HEARTS MAY LOOK DIFFERENT

Finally, Getting the Right Diagnoses

On New Year's Day 2021, with the Tokyo Games just six months away, Olympic high jumper Priscilla L. made a resolution. **"I resolved to control only what I'm able to control,"** she says.

She had survived the emotional upheaval of 2020, when the COVID-19 pandemic forced the postponement of the Tokyo Olympics. She set her sights on 2021 and kept on training. But then, 17 days into the new year, she tested positive for COVID-19.

"I instantly cried," Priscilla says. "I didn't know what was happening, but I knew I'd miss the start of indoor track and field season. It was devastating."

Priscilla had many of the telltale COVID-19 symptoms – lack of energy, sinus congestion and a loss of smell and taste. The only thing she did not have was a fever. She spent a week on the couch.

When she slowly tried to start training again, she started having chest pain. "I had no cardiac problems before," says Priscilla, age 32. "I went to an Urgent Care, then an ER, and they couldn't find anything wrong with my heart."

In February, a visit to another doctor revealed she had pleurisy, an inflammation of the lungs that can cause intermittent chest pain. "I was cleared for 30% of my workouts, but that wouldn't be enough to make the Olympics," says Priscilla, who lives in Wildwood, NJ, and has dual citizenship in the U.S. and Antigua and Barbuda. She competes internationally for Antigua and Barbuda.

When her chest pain did not get better in March, she went to another doctor, had an MRI and received some startling news. "He said my heart didn't look good and I'd have to retire from competition," Priscilla says. "I couldn't believe it."

But Priscilla was not about to take no for an answer. She searched high and low for an expert who could give her a second opinion.

"Dr. Martinez told me that there was nothing wrong with my heart; it just looked different because I'm an athlete."

For more information, visit atlantichealth.org/sportscardio. Someone she knew connected her with Barry Lowell, MD, an interventional cardiologist for Atlantic Health System. "Dr. Lowell told me he knew a specialist who deals with athletes and hearts, and he'd know exactly how to diagnose this," Priscilla says.

On March 31, Priscilla and her mom traveled three hours north to meet with that doctor, Atlantic Health System sports cardiology specialist Matthew Martinez, MD, on the campus of Morristown Medical Center. Dr. Martinez, who is board-certified and fellowship-trained in cardiovascular disease, is a nationally recognized expert in identifying and treating athletes with underlying heart issues such as arrhythmia or hypertrophic cardiomyopathy (thickening of the heart muscle, the most common cause of sudden cardiac death in young athletes).

Dr. Martinez examined Priscilla, reviewed her MRIs and gave her a definitive answer. "He told me that there was nothing wrong with my heart; it just looked different because I'm an athlete. Then he said, 'Start training for the Olympics!'"

In late June, she competed in the National Track & Field Championships in the Bahamas. While she fell just short of making the Olympic standard and did not compete in the Tokyo Olympics, she's proud of her high jump career, which has included one Olympic appearance (Rio 2016) and two Pan-American Games silver medals. And she's looking forward to a healthy future.

Morristown Medical Center uses new technology for shoulder replacement operations

roundbreaking shoulder surgeries are now being performed at Morristown Medical Center – one of only a few hospitals in the U.S. chosen to take it on.

Shoulder replacement surgery serves to replace arthritic surfaces in the shoulder with artificial parts. Complicating this is the unique anatomy of the glenoid socket and humeral ball, which often present a significant challenge due to anatomical variations and deformities. Mixed reality – which is performed by Eric Black, MD, a board-certified orthopedic surgeon specializing in shoulder and elbow surgery, anchors virtual objects into the real world and allows the surgeon to interact with the objects before and during surgery.

This technology can be used to assist in the placement of implants during shoulder replacement surgery, specifically in complex cases. It can also be used as an educational tool to teach other surgeons how to navigate complicated cases. Less than a dozen U.S. surgeons are able to use the technology.

Mixed reality also allows surgeons to have immediate access to patient history, X-rays, three-dimensional CT scans and implant choices throughout the operation. This allows surgeons real-time access to critical information that can help facilitate accurate implant placement, avoid complications and maximize patient outcomes.

Complex shoulder replacements are Dr. Black's specialty. On average, surgeons who are considered to perform a "high volume" of shoulder replacements in the U.S. perform about 10 annually. Dr. Black does about 160 or more each year.

"Mixed reality is an incredible technology that synthesizes the online preoperative planning software with real-time data analysis during surgery. This allows the surgeon to accurately implement a surgical plan with incredible accuracy," Dr. Black "At Morristown Medical Center, we are committed to investigating and utilizing the latest technology for the benefit of our orthopedic surgeons and the patients in order to provide the patient with the safest procedures and best outcomes." – James Wittig, MD, chairman, Orthopedic Surgery Morristown Medical Center and medical director, Orthopedics, Orthopedic Oncology and Sarcoma Surgery, Atlantic Health System

says. "Surgical steps such as visualizing a humeral cut as well as positioning the glenoid implant can be made entirely more efficient with this technology for a fraction of the cost of a robot but with the same accuracy. It is a complete game changer, and I am honored to be a part of the rollout."

As a teaching tool, mixed reality has the potential to allow surgeons who do not have a lot of experience with a certain procedure or implant to invite another surgeon to be a surgical mentor and guide them through the operation remotely. As a virtual hologram projected above the patient, surgical mentors can watch the surgeon perform the operation and provide feedback with the use of real-time visual cues.

Mixed reality can be a powerful tool for education, clinical assessment and intraoperative navigation. It is at the forefront of orthopedics, with the primary goals to enhance patient outcomes and improve implant longevity. "At Morristown Medical Center, we are committed to investigating and utilizing the latest technology for the benefit of our orthopedic surgeons and the patients in order to provide the patient with the safest procedures and best outcomes," says James Wittig, MD, a board-certified orthopedic surgeon and chairman, Orthopedic Surgery Morristown Medical Center and medical director, Orthopedics, Orthopedic Oncology and Sarcoma Surgery, Atlantic Health System. "Dr. Black is a true innovator in the realm of mixed reality for surveillance procedures and is representative of one of the innumerable outstanding orthopedic surgeons we have in the department."


PARTNERSHIP

"This new affiliation will strengthen our acclaimed cardiac program, while significantly enhancing our ability to care for patients with advanced liver disease," says Atlantic Health System president and CEO Brian Gragnolati. "Our patients will now have access to one of the nation's leading transplantation programs, with expert care both in New York and close to home in New Jersey that will ensure continuity of care and the best outcomes."

ELIGIBILITY

Eligible patients will receive comprehensive pre- and post-transplant care from Atlantic Health System's top-ranked hospitals and health care providers and have transplants performed through the renowned NYU Langone Transplant Institute.

"This new partnership will elevate transplant care for thousands of New Jersey families – and save many lives," says Robert Montgomery, MD, DPhil, director of the NYU Langone Transplant Institute and the H. Leon Pachter Chair of Surgery at NYU Langone.



HEART PATIENTS

Pre- and postoperative care for heart transplant patients at Morristown Medical Center's Heart Failure program will be provided by a multidisciplinary team including physicians, advanced practice nurses, and registered nurses, led by Abhishek Singh, MD, PhD, who is triple-board-certified in internal medicine, cardiology, and advanced heart failure and transplant cardiology.

LIVER PATIENTS

Overlook Medical Center and NYU Langone will develop a liver transplant service to diagnose and treat a broad spectrum of liver disease, led by Harmit S. Kalia, DO, a board-certified hepatologist and director of liver transplant outreach at NYU Langone, who will join Overlook's staff while continuing to practice at NYU Langone. Most pre- and postoperative care for liver transplant patients can be provided at Overlook, which offers a full radiological suite of services, including interventional radiologists who treat advanced liver disease, led by Yousaf Mahmood, MD, who is board-certified in diagnostic, vascular and interventional radiology.

Community Donates \$40.3 Million

to Morristown Medical Center Renovation, Expansion



he Foundation for Morristown Medical Center is pleased to announce that community members contributed \$40.3 million toward the critical renovation and expansion of Carol G. Simon Cancer Center, Gagnon Cardiovascular Institute and Goryeb Children's Hospital, significantly exceeding the initial campaign goal of \$38.5 million. More than 1,500 donors, including the Gagnon, Goryeb and Simon families, supported the Growing Forward Campaign that launched on Giving Tuesday, December 3, 2019.

Projects were initially identified to not only enhance the capacity of these Centers of Excellence but also to create patient-centric units where caregivers could provide the extraordinary care the community has come to rely upon.
